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RACINE COUNTY MOBILIZES COMMUNITY RESPONSE AHEAD OF SNAP BENEFIT PAUSE

RACINE COUNTY— Beginning November 1, SNAP (FoodShare) benefits will be temporarily paused as the federal government shutdown continues, impacting thousands of families and individuals who rely on these funds for their groceries.

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) has confirmed that no new FoodShare funds will be issued until the shutdown ends. Even if the shutdown ends before November, benefits will not be distributed on their regular schedule. Residents with remaining funds (received before November 1) on their QUEST cards may continue using them, but should be aware that the federal government <u>may restrict card use</u> beginning November 1 if the shutdown continues.

FoodShare applications are still being accepted; however, DHS has advised that approvals for applications submitted on or after October 21 may be delayed until normal federal funding resumes. Women, Infants & Children (WIC) benefits are not affected at this time. DHS has confirmed that Wisconsin's WIC program remains funded through October, with November benefits expected to continue as scheduled.

While this situation is under federal control, Racine County Human Services, in partnership with local schools, churches, nonprofits, and food banks, is preparing a coordinated community response to ensure residents continue to have access to food and essential support.

"Food security is a basic need, and we are committed to making sure no Racine County resident goes hungry during this pause," said Hope Otto, Human Services Director, "We are working closely with community partners to connect families with hot meals, pantry services, and emergency supports."

Where Can I Find Help?

Racine County and its partners are working together to help residents during this disruption. The Racine County Food Bank is "your food pantry's food pantry." Each month, the Food Bank distributes more than 90,000 pounds of food to local pantries, ensuring everyone in our neighborhood has access to healthy, plentiful food. While the Food Bank does not distribute food directly, it collaborates with partner pantries across the county.

"Racine County Food Bank is here to help. We will be working tirelessly to ensure there is enough food to bridge the gap during this pause," said Stephanie Sklba, Executive Director of Racine County Food Bank.
